



SRHR Questionnaire Control Group Results Beira, Mozambique

Methodology

The evaluation method used was a questionnaire form. The questionnaire was divided into the following sub-sections:

- A. Introduction
- B. Knowledge & Attitude
- C. Abstinence
- D. Being Safer
- E. Condom Use

47 questionnaires were distributed in total and the control group completed them in writing.

Characteristics of Control Group

The control group was from the Matadouro Secondary School in Manga, grade 8, 9 and 10 consisting of 47 students in total. The student's ages varied from 15 years to 22 years of age, with a gender divide of 18 males, 18 females, a total of 11 didn't provide an answer to the gender question on the questionnaire. There was an approximate 50:50 divide between males and females in the entire class group of 47. The students in the control group were of similar age and came from similar socio-economic backgrounds as the students of Young Africa.

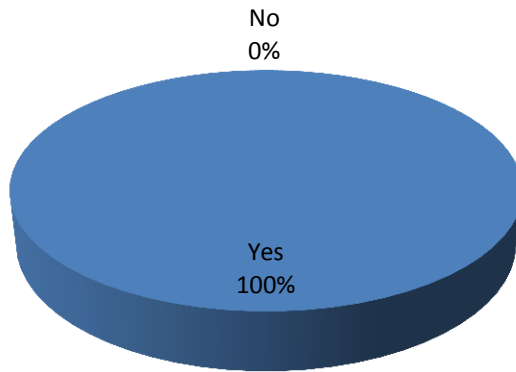

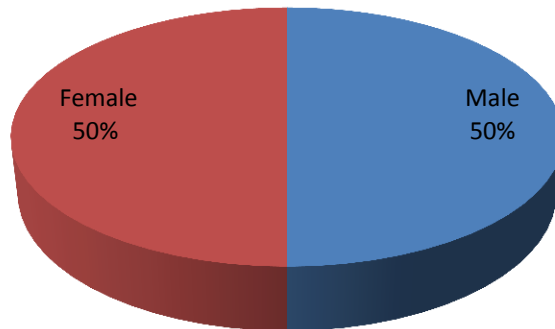

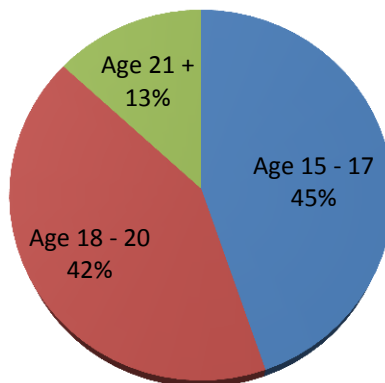
1. Do you give your consent for participation in this study?



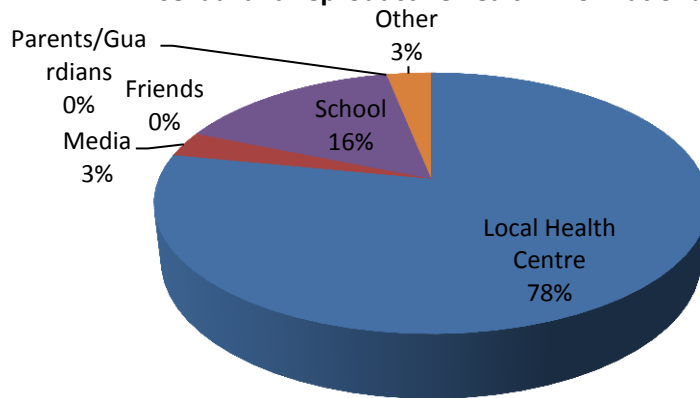
2. Gender Divide

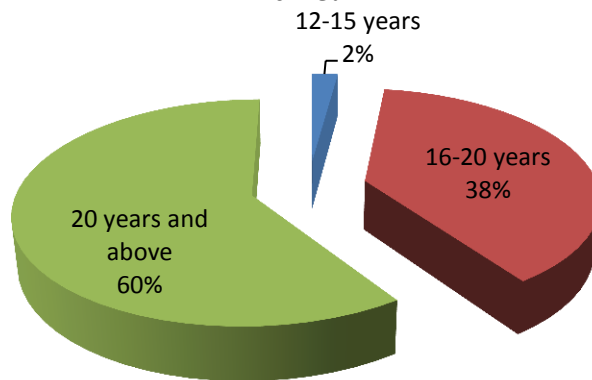


4. What is your main source of information on HIV/AIDS and sexual and reproductive health information?

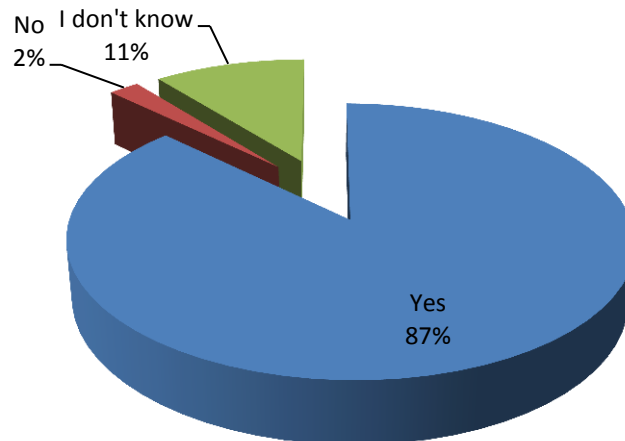


B. WHAT DO YOU KNOW AND WHAT IS YOUR OPINION? [KNOWLEDGE & ATTITUDE]

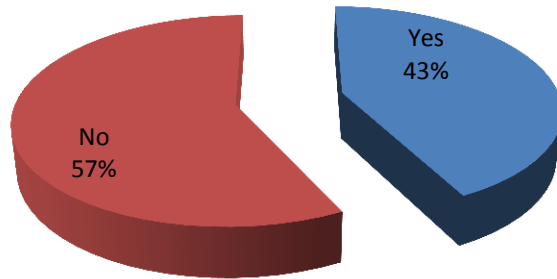
5. What is the right age for a person to have sex for the first time?



6. Can a person get HIV by having sex?

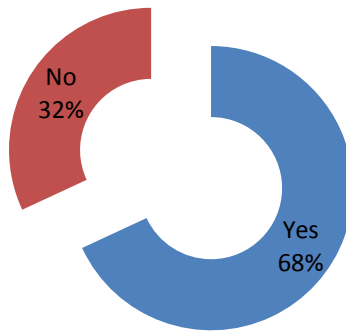


7. Do you know your HIV status?

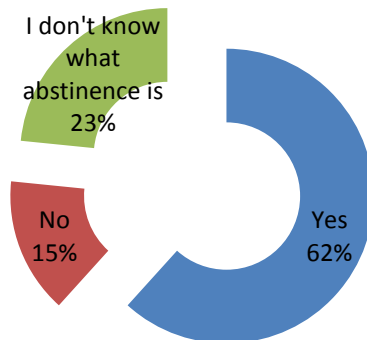

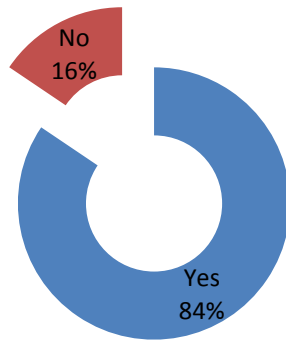
8. Do you know what abstinence is?



9. Is abstinence something you would choose or recommend to a friend?

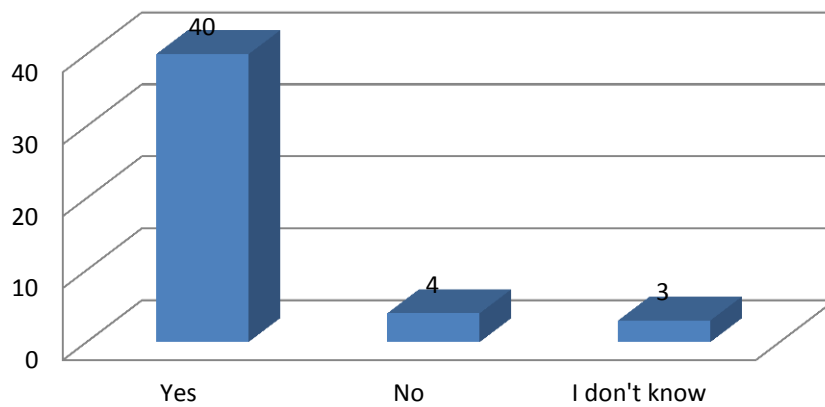


10. Have you decided to delay having sex for the first time?

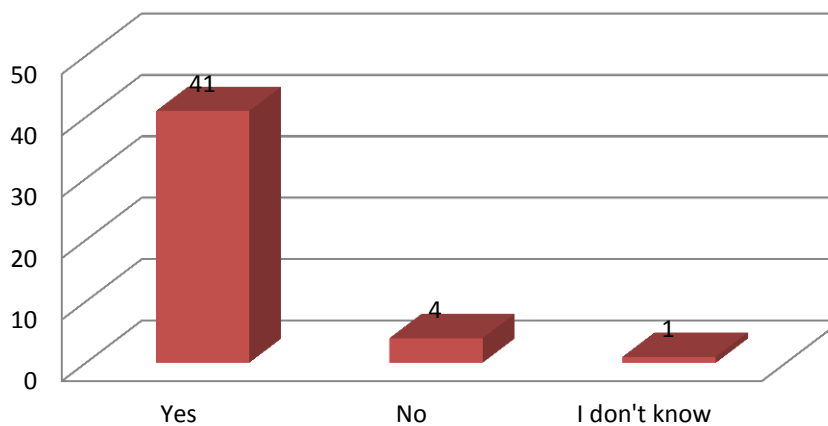


D. BEING SAFER – (Being Faithful or Reducing number of sexual partners)

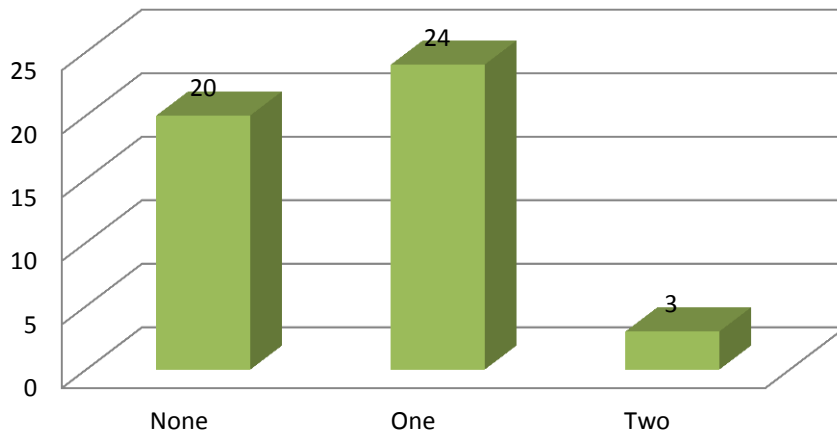
11. Being faithful to my boyfriend or girlfriend is a good way for reducing my risk of getting HIV?



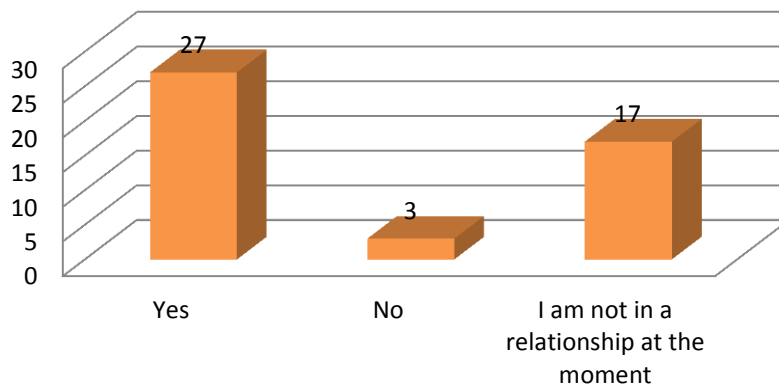
12. Reducing the number of sex partners that I have is a good way of reducing my risk of getting HIV?



13. How many sex partners do you have right now?

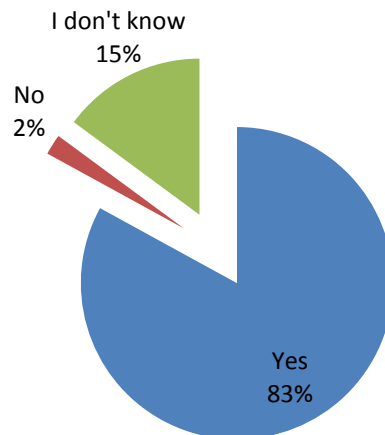


14. If you are in a relationship, are you faithful to your boyfriend/girlfriend? (i.e. are you only having sex with your boyfriend or girlfriend?)

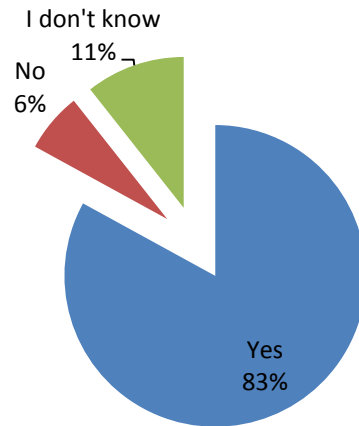

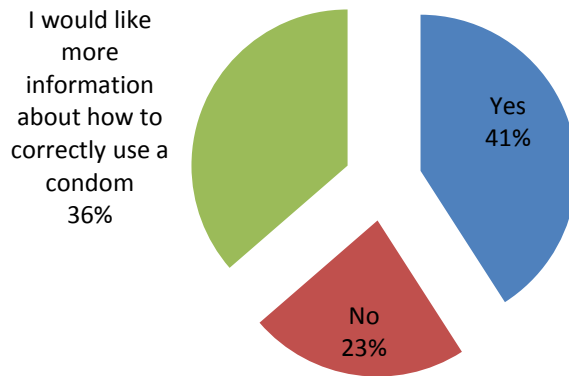
15. Condoms can help reduce the risk of getting HIV?



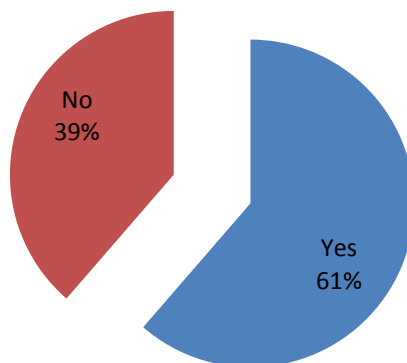
16. Would you choose to use a condom or recommend it to a friend?



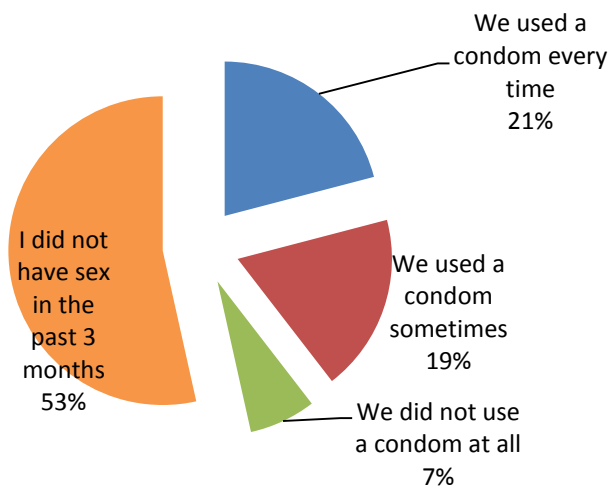
17. Do you know how to correctly use a condom?
